Pima Pineapple is Trailer Trash; Turk's Head is the Quiet immortal: Two ways to live on an Ancient Landscape

Bob received his masters degree in science from the University of Arizona and later spent 3 years with the Smithsonian Tropical Research Institute in Panama. He is now a practicing plant Demographer and has spent more than 5 years working with plant population dynamics. Bob will talk about his field studies on two endangered cacti in the Tucson area, Pima Pineapple Cactus, Coryphantha scheeri var. robustispina and Nichol's Turk's Head Cactus, Echinocactus borizonthalonius var. nicholii. His work is primarily focused on understanding the population dynamics of these two cacti. This research has been supported by contracts with the Arizona Department of Agriculture and is currently supported by a grant from T & E, Inc., and a contract through the Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation. Bob will talk about how he sets up permanent plots to study cactus populations and what he has learned in watching the growth and fates of these plants. Jackrabbits, bighorn sheep, cactus beetles and maybe microbes all may play a role in the life and times of these two cacti. Hopefully, some of you may try your hand at setting up permanent plots for wild cactus populations and teasing out the factors that control their fates. Bob will help outline ways to study habitats of plant populations and may help you understand more about plant life.

Dr. Ted Anderson's New Cactus Book soon to be released

(The) CACTUS FAMILY by Dr. Ted Anderson (2000). A BIG book with unusual encyclopedic coverage of the entire family Cactaceae: 125 genera and 1811 species. This monumental tome is the first English language treatment of all the genera and species of cacti since the monograph by Britton & Rose in 1919-1923. The important point about this book is Dr. Anderson's treatment of ALL cacti species throughout their natural ranges in the world. Additionally, this is a book that includes almost all aspects of the natural history of cacti, their uses from fishhooks to narcotics, their cultivation, and descriptions of virtually all the nearly two thousand species! The first four chapters deal with the distinct features: fundamentals/ morphology/structure plus conservation and cultivation of cacti. The enormous amount of descriptions are short, but information-packed. Over 1,000 nice color photos fill the book in large format. A HUGE book, with about 760 pages of text, 8-?" x 11", hardbound w/color dustjacket. Not since Lyman Benson's book on cacti (1982) has there been a book published as important as this one! Publication date expected mid-April to mid-June 2001. Priced at \$94.95.




Three of our members will present some interesting views on these fantastic members of the cactus family.

Chris has been a member of TCSS since 1993. He is a native Tucsonan and became seriously interested in cactus & succulents in 1988 when he was given two salvaged plants by a construction worker. After one of the plants, a Peniocereus, flowered he photographed it and started giving the photos away as Christmas gifts. His recent interest in Ferocactus stems largely from experience observing the interesting variety of Ferocactus wislizenii characteristics during the last two years of TCSS salvaging activities. Another spark came on a trip to Gold Basin (just south of the Lake Mead Recreation Area) in February of 2000, where he observed numerous Echinocactus polycephalus v. xeranthemoides and F cylindraceous in habitat. He has since collected a variety of Ferocactus and Echinocactus species via local nurseries and mail order houses.

Robbin has been collecting cacti for about 8 years. He collects mostly Arizona, California, Baja, Sonora, Chihuahuan, West Texas and New Mexico cacti, concentrating on what can be found and is most interesting. He likes finding unusual plants and also exploring the habitats wherever cacti can be seen in the wild.

Three of our members will present some interesting views on these fantastic members of the cactus family.

Chris has been a member of TCSS since 1993. He is a native Tucsonan and became seriously interested in cactus & succulents in 1988 when he was given two salvaged plants by a construction worker. After one of the plants, a Peniocereus, flowered he photographed it and started giving the photos away as Christmas gifts. His recent interest in Ferocactus stems largely from experience observing the interesting variety of Ferocactus wislizenii characteristics during the last two years of TCSS salvaging activities. Another spark came on a trip to Gold Basin (just south of the Lake Mead Recreation Area) in February of 2000, where he observed numerous Echinocactus polycephalus v. xeranthemoides and F. cylindraceous in habitat. He has since collected a variety of Ferocactus and Echinocactus species via local nurseries and mail order houses.

Robbin has been collecting cacti for about 8 years. He collects mostly Arizona, California, Baja, Sonora, Chihuahuan, West Texas and New Mexico cacti, concentrating on what can be found and is most interesting. He likes finding unusual plants and also exploring the habitats wherever cacti can be seen in the wild.










A magnificent Corypbantba recurvata in babitat within the Atascosa mountains of Southern Arizona



Bob Scarborough has a M.S. degree in geology from the University of Arizona, and is currently staff geologist at the Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum where he divides his time between education and research. He received much training while employed by the Arizona Geological Survey, having worked on projects concerning safety of dams for the Bureau of Reclamation, geologic mapping in various parts of the Southwest, and an inventory of all uranium resources for the State. In private consulting practice, he has looked for deeply buried petroleum in the lower Colorado River region (there isn't any), has mapped landslides along coastal California (there are too many, including behind Jack Lemmon's back yard), and did the geologic assessment for the first Mt. Graham telescope EIS project for the U of A (rejected because the picture was too gloomy). He has suffered through the upper reaches of the Amazon basin while looking for gold (its there, but too hard to find), and iceburg-covered shores of Newfoundland and the Mediterranean coast of Spain while searching for commercial gypsum deposits (siesta coffee in Spain is 300% better than in Canada). His current research interest lies in the origin of the Colorado River and the Grand Canyon - (Don't even ask about this unless you're prepared to wait out his story).



Greg Starr will present

Hunting Agaves in Mexico

Greg's presentation will consist of showing samples, discussing the variety of Agaves found, and a slide presentation of some plants in habitat.

Mexican Agaves cover all the variation found in the genus. Both inflorescence types (spicate and paniculate) are represented. Offsetting and nonoffsetting types are found. Narrow leaves and broad leaves, and desert, high montane, and tropical types are all found in Mexico.

Greg graduated from the University of Arizona with a bachelors degree in horticulture. After working in the landscape industry, he went back to school. He received a masters degree in Plant Sciences with a dual emphasis on botany and horticulture. While working on his master's degree, Greg worked under the tutelage of both Warren Jones and Dr. Charles Mason. He learned first hand many aspects of collecting expeditions.

Upon graduating from the University of Arizona a second time, Greg started his nursery (imaginatively called Starr Nursery) in 1985, and through the years has collected, tested, and introduced many Chihuahuan Desert plants into the land-scape industry. He has written a monograph on the genus Hesperaloe, and has recently focused his attention to the genus Agave.

This should be a great presentation that will give a much needed look at Agaves in their natural setting. Everyone should come bring a friend and enjoy Greg's perspective on these important garden plants.


Al has done a really great job during his time as our President and on behalf of the membership I would like to extend our thanks for all he has done.





Greg Starr will present Hunting Agaves in Mexico

Greg's presentation will consist of showing samples, discussing the variety of Agaves found, and a slide presentation of some plants in habitat.

Mexican Agaves cover all the variation found in the genus. Both inflorescence types (spicate and paniculate) are represented. Offsetting and nonoffsetting types are found. Narrow leaves and broad leaves, and desert, high montane, and tropical types are all found in Mexico.

Greg graduated from the University of Arizona with a bachelors degree in horticulture. After working in the landscape industry, he went back to school. He received a masters degree in Plant Sciences with a dual emphasis on botany and horticulture. While working on his master's degree, Greg worked under the tutelage of both Warren Jones and Dr. Charles Mason. He learned first hand many aspects of collecting expeditions.

Upon graduating from the University of Arizona a second time, Greg started his nursery (imaginatively called Starr Nursery) in 1985, and through the years has collected, tested, and introduced many Chihuahuan Desert plants into the land-scape industry. He has written a monograph on the genus Hesperaloe, and has recently focused his attention to the genus Agave.

This should be a great presentation that will give a much needed look at Agaves in their natural setting. Everyone should come bring a friend and enjoy Greg's perspective on these important garden plants.



Saddlebrooke Successful Salvage

During July, August, September, and October the Salvage Crew completed the bulk of its work at the newest construction phase within the SaddleBrooke Resort Community in Southern Pinal County.

Our sincere and resounding thanks are directed toward Don Fickett of SaddleBrooke Development Company and their parent company Robson Communities for partnering with us on this huge undertaking. We look forward to future projects with SaddleBrooke and Robson as they may arise.

With the assistance of some twenty-odd crew members (you all know who you are!) over twelve weekends, well in excess of fourteen hundred plants were removed from the site and are destined for new homes throughout Arizona. The various species involved were Echinocereus faciculatus, Echinocereus fendleri var. rectispinus and some possible hybrid plants of unknown origin. Various Opuntias and Cylindropuntias. Escobaria vivipara subsp. arizonica as per Dan Birt's description, and maybe some Escobaria vivipara subsp. bisbeeana as well. Ferocactus wislizenii, Mammillaria grahamii and Mammillaria grahamii subsp. olivae and some thirty Ocotillo, Fourquieria splendens of which about half ended up at the Arizona Sonora Desert Museum and the University of Arizona Cooperative Extension Headquarters.

Nurseryman Jim Elliott of Arizona Cactus Sales in Chandler (480-963-1061) was a strategic partner in acquiring hundreds of our plants for distribution

The Big Ones: Columnar Cacti and the People Who Use Them

David will take us on a tour of big cactus from the U.S., Mexico, Ecuador, and Argentina, describing their importance in the lives of the native people and the lands where they grow. David was originally scheduled to speak for the club in November, but "The Desert Speaks" needed his help in Baja with a program being filmed there.

David is a research social scientist at the Southwest Center of the University of Arizona. He conducts intensive social and ecological studies of indigenous people and their lands, which includes the role of great cacti in native cultures. His research activities have taken him from the southwestern U.S. into Mexico and points south as he investigates historic human geography. Prior to his adventures with giant cacti and indigenous people to the south, David spent 12 years on the Pima County Board of Supervisors, and was the executive director of the Tucson Audubon Society.

His books include, Where the Desert Meets the Sea: A Trader in the Land of the Seri Indians (1988), Sonora: An Intimate Geography (1996), and Scattered Round Stones: A Mayo Village in Sonora (1998). He is co-editor of Gentry's Rio Mayo Plants: The Tropical Deciduous Forest and Environs of Northwest Mexico, and The Tropical Deciduous Forest of Alamos: Biodiversity and Conservation in an Endangered Ecosystem. His latest book, Mayo Ethnobotany: Knowledge, Land, and Tradition in Northwest Mexico, was written with Thomas Van Devender and will be available in January 2002.
