



He will show approximately 40 photographs to give everyone a peek at this amazing succulent garden wonder.


Filled with magnificent plants in a beautiful setting, the garden is located in Monte Carlo, a truly grand city on the French Riviera. This amazing garden was structured on the side

of a limestone hill and contains a variety of succulent plants landscaped onto the rock face. This public garden, which spreads across a total surface of approximately 41,000 square feet was inaugurated by Prince Louis II, and



is the result of a collection of succulent plants started back in 1895.

The 2400 hours of yearly sunshine produce flowers of varied colors and shapes throughout the year.




value of these plants within our community and the American Southwest.





and the last CSSA National Convention, and he has been a plant vendor at most of these events. The Nursery is tricky to find



and I suggest you call first to make sure he is there and ask for directions. Of course, I didn't, so I spent about an hour on a driving tour of the area. Miles has acquired a large, diverse, collection of




plants that he grows from seed, cuttings and grafting. His growing techniques enable him to produce larger healthy plants in a short

period of time. One these techniques is to grow seedlings and cuttings in specially prepared ground beds from April to September and then repot them for wintering. His results are convincing and it's something I am going to try. (I am sure that I will not have the same results but it will be fun.) You might also ask him about Root-Gel, a product that he has had great success with. It's a rooting hormone and fungicide in a gel preparation that sticks to the cutting.

Miles' To Go is a must for collectors.

The Tucson Cactus and Succulent Society is proud of the highly successful "first-annual" Exposition. Every aspect of this endeavor was a resounding success. We had a vision, and we brought it home!



At the top of the list of successes is the record number of members who pitched in to make it what is was. This is obviously not your typical

Society, with a small core of over-worked members and a big following of members who show up for meetings and trips. No, we all pitched in together, and we did a great job.

It's a hopeless task to start singling out members for recognition – some will always be missed. But I want to recognize, and thank, many of the key members who made this such a success.



It all started with Jack Ramsey, who had the vision to suggest the event. Jack admits that the final product greatly exceeded his expectations, but he was the one who got the ball rolling. Rescue a Big Success

Thirty-seven eager volunteers showed up early Saturday morning on August 16 at Skyline and Campbell for our first rescue opportunity this summer, and only our second outing this year. We worked diligently for several hours on nine acres of steep, rocky



terrain, digging up plants before the development site grading. It didn't take long for all of the new recruits to learn the basics, and discover some underused muscles.



The specimens on this site were in beautiful condition after recent rains and rescue crew members were fortunate to have the opportunity to remove so many from harms way so that the plants will continue to be

enjoyed. Ocotillo, barrels in bloom and several pincushion size plants are ready to take up residence in new landscapes around Tucson. Most of the barrels on this property were exceptionally large and required lots of muscle power by three to four people using a carpet sling to haul them out of the site and load them into vehicles for transport. We have several of these large specimens in our rescue

holding nursery. Call Joe or Patsy at 575-7126 if interested.

The weather cooperated for the rescue and rains a few days before helped loosen the



soil but the jackhammer was beneficial to help coax the larger ocotillo out of their rocky hillside home. A total of 35 ocotillo, 50 barrels, 45 pincushion size cacti, and one large hedgehog were rescued. All of the ocotillo and many of the barrels went home with Rescue Crew members who volunteered over 150

hours of work to save these plants. Other prospective sites are being reviewed. Rescue notices are emailed to Rescue Crew members on Thursday if there is a rescue the following weekend.

Financial Details

Our treasury continues to maintain a healthy balance of about \$21,000. Final gross sales figures from the spring show and sale were \$15,694.63, making our profit from the event about \$2000. While profit

Richard Felger Drylands Institute "South American and Sonoran Desert Connection "


Richard Felger will discuss the South American deserts and the Sonoran Desert connection. Why the differences and why the similarities.

So make your reservations early so we can see how things are shaping up. Some of the features of the conference are:





Board Meetings are the second Tuesday of the Month at The U of A College of Pharmacy, Room 333.



Also in 2005 will be our second plant exposition. This year's event was fabulous. I know we learned a lot and will make the next one even better.



Rescue Crew Responds

Seventy-two acres on the South West corner or La Canada and Tangerine are destined for a new residential development to be called Rancho Verde. The town of Oro Valley was instrumental in lining up the TCSS Rescue Crew with the developer, Monterey Homes,



so native cacti not covered by the Native Plant Protection Ordinance (NPPO) could be rescued. We were given very short notice and responded within five days to do a site survey, get all the paperwork completed, acquire tags, and perform the rescue operations before heavy equipment moved on site to begin construction.

On top of the short notice it was the Thanksgiving week so that posed extra challenges and we had a limited Rescue Crew. But, in spite of all this we had twelve crew members on Saturday and eleven members on Sunday, putting in about 100 hours of rescue work to rescue 445 cacti. The Hedgehogs and Christmas Cholla were some of the largest and choicest we have encountered and there were many barrels and Mammillaria as well.

A couple of special barrels were encountered but we did not have the time or resources to deal with them with such a short rescue period. The best we could do was to take a few photos to share with others. The property has hundreds of small saguaros and the

developer will see that all these are saved. There were also several large Saguaros, two Ocotillo and a several Yucca that the developer will relocate on site. About 30% of the 72 acres is designated as native save areas and will be left undisturbed. Rescue Crew members each used detailed maps to be sure we stayed out of these areas.
